During the month the patrol division had the following activity:

- 18 Pedestrian/Suspicious Stops were conducted
- 87 Business (Walk and Talk) Checks (officers entering businesses during normal hours)
- 10,304 Premise Checks (officer checking cursory checks of businesses after hours
- Officers made sixteen (16) misdemeanor and/or warrant arrests
- Officers made one (9) felony arrest
- Officers issued 97 written traffic warnings
- Officers issued 37 compliance (local ordinance) tickets
- Officers issued 2 parking tickets
- Officers handled an additional 421 calls for service and wrote 76 related reports.
- Thirty-one (31) trucks were weighed based on a suspicion of being overweight and fined accordingly

Investigations Division had the following activity:

- Closed nine (9) cases; two (2) administratively, two (2) no complaints from the Will County State's Attorney, three (3) refused cooperation from the victim, one (1) Notice to Appear (arrest) Issued, and one (1) unfounded complaint
- Added eighteen (18) new cases for formal investigation.
- Ten (10) cases are awaiting State's Attorney review.

Training:

- Two (2) officers received firearm training (nineteen(19) drills), and nine (9) range days were utilized by visiting LE agencies.
- Officers participated in a total of 144 hours of off-site training.
- Each officer participated in 23 Lexipol daily training scenarios.
- All members have completed one PLI online training course (approximately one (2) hour in length) on the topic of Body Worn Cameras.

Administration:


- Wrote a grant seeking funding to purchase a law enforcement drone for operations. Award decision will be made in September.
- Organized and participated in a "Cops and Kids Back to School" Event for August 28, 2022 at Wilmington High School. The Department received over \$20000 in donations that went towards purchasing school supplies for students (98 book bags containing listed school supplies for 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th grade) and teachers (Clorox wipes and Kleenex).
- The accreditation process is underway with all Department policies and procedures downloaded into the accreditation portal through Power DMS system.


• The Department has an extensive number of policies that require modification to bring to the best practice standards of the Illinois Law Enforcement Accreditation Program.





The Wilimington Police Department responded to and investigated thirteen (13) reported Index Crimes in July of 2022. The same number of crimes in 2021. All of the assault and battery complaints in August of 2022 were domestic in nature.





Despite the change in sign location and the increase in fine amounts, the department is still writing a substantial number of exclusionary zone entry violations. The department will continue to perform increased patrols and maintain strict compliance with the ordinance.

Stolen Vehicle Motor Vehicle Arrest Leads to Additional Felony Financial Crime and Drug Charges

On 08/06/2022 at approximately 07:30 hours, the Wilmington police department located a suspicious gray Hyundai Accent with Missouri registration RG2U6U parked and occupied by one (1) male subject at the first entrance to the Des Plaines Fish and Wildlife area on New River Road. The Hyundai was reported stolen out of Missouri.

Members of the Department performed a felony traffic stop and ordered the male, later identified as Isaac Loveall, from the vehicle. The driver complied and was then detained without further incident. After confirming that the vehicle was reported stolen through the originating agency, Osage Beach, Missouri Police Department, an inventory search was conducted of the gray Hyundai.

During the search, officers located a duffle bag containing numerous financial documents addressed to other individuals, credit cards in the names of others, a credit card terminal, a social security card belonging to a female and a small locked digital safe in the passenger compartment. Drug paraphernalia was also discovered on the floorboard of the vehicle. Within the trunk of the stolen motor vehicle, officers located an additional locked black sentry safe.

The offender, Isaac Loveall was subsequently transported to the Wilmington Police Department. Loveall was later transported to the Will County Adult Detention Facility and initially charged with a possession of a stolen motor vehicle, drug paraphernalia and deceptive practices pending further investigation.

On 08/10/2022, an officer of the Wilmington police department obtained and subsequently executed a search warrant on the black sentry safe and the small locked digital safe at the police department. Projects:

The Flume Project at the Water Reclamation Plant has been completed.

The new Water Treatment Plant building's structural steel has been set and paneling is being installed. This outer shell should be completed in approximately two weeks.

The Lime Contract with New Era Spreading has been completed. New Era removed approximately 440 tons of Dry Lime and 750 tons of Lime Sludge.

Geosyntec is scheduling a joint meeting with the Illinois EPA to go over their recommendation for our FY24 Nutrient Assessment Reduction Plan. (NARP)

Darin Clarke with Maguire Iron has completed and presented a free tank inspection of our three water towers and two clear well-ground storage tanks.

Sewer Department:

The Sewer Department has completed the annual inspection and cleaning of the west clarifier. This included repairs and fabrication to the flush valve for the scum skimmer. Johnke Tree Service has completed the tree removal around the Haga shed.

Water Department:

The Water Department has done a tremendous job keeping plant operations sustainable during the demolition and reconstruction of their new building. In addition, 20 water meters were replaced in the month of August.

Street Department:

The Street Department has completed 32 work orders assigned in the month of August including two very large asphalt patches on Chicago Street and County Road as well as a lead service line replacement. In addition to these items 75 fire hydrants were painted in August.

Budget Impact: \$61,190.80 initially, approximately \$52,000 Annually

Request: Consideration of restarting the City of Wilmington Leaf Vacuum Program

Discussion: In years past the City of Wilmington had operated a leaf vacuum program. The program consisted of residents of the City of Wilmington moving their leaves to the parkway behind the curb in wind rows and two Public Works employees would come by with our leaf vacuum on a route and remove the leaves. To consider readopting this program the estimated cost is \$61,190.80. It is estimated we would operate this program for 6 weeks averaging 4 loads per day. The leaves from the leaf vacuum would be dumped at a city location and then hauled away in a 6-wheeler. Each 6-wheel load would be hauled to Christiansen Farms Premium Compost Supplier. The Leaf Vacuum Repair is an estimated amount to include the replacement of eight tires, radiator, wheel bearings, suction tube, hydraulic cylinder, hydraulic actuator with wiring harness, hydraulic and a mesh filter screen. This program will also require three of the Streets Department's employees for the 6-week duration. This is not a budgeted request.
