Snow Reminders



Take Time to Clear at least a 3-foot radius around fire hydrants in your neighborhood. During a fire, seconds count. The extra minutes removing snow around fire hydrants may save your neighbor's home or your own.

NO PARKING after 2 inches of snow accumulation. At any time after two inches or more of snow has accumulated on any public street or alley, whether the accumulation is due to new fallen snow or drifting or blowing snow from previous snowfalls, it is unlawful to park any vehicle on any such public street or alley until the City has plowed the public street or alley. This critical ordinance allows plow drivers the space to do their work quickly, efficiently and safely. Wilmington has more than 350 lane miles of streets, in addition to cul-de-sacs and alleys, maintained by Public Works.

Tips for Protecting Valuables During Holiday Season

The holiday season typically brings families together, joy to the masses and reasons to shop at our favorite stores. In the midst of the celebrations, this also means there is an increased possibility of being more vulnerable to theft and other holiday-related crimes. Whether you are traveling or staying local, the Wilmington Police Department encourages all residents to remember to remain alert and be proactive to stay safe this holiday season.

If you have to leave your packages in your car, be sure to place them out of sight in your locked trunk. Whenever possible, it is highly encouraged to park in well-lit areas that heighten visibility and never leave your car unlocked or left running with keys in it while untended.



For online shoppers, be on alert for porch pirates. Porch pirates aim to snatch your joy by stealing packages that have been delivered to your home. To help prevent this, try to schedule the delivery at a time when you are home or pick them up from the shipping facility.

Electronic Recycling Continues in 2024

Will County will continue its free electronic drop-off program with the City throughout 2024. This service takes place the second **Recycli** Thursday of each month from 5 PM to 7 PM at the City Hall front parking lot.



Items for recycling include the following: televisions (limit 2), monitors, printers, computers (desktops, laptops, notebooks, tablets), electronic keyboards, fax machines, videocassette recorders, portable digital music players, DVD players, DVD recorders, video game consoles, small scale servers, scanners, electronic mice, digital converter boxes, cable receivers, satellite receivers, cell phones, computer cable, portable digital assistants, and zip drives. Holiday string lights that are no longer working may also be dropped off for recycling.

The 2024 dates for electronic recycling are as follows:
